St. Stephen's AME Church faces north on the south west corner of Mayfield Avenue and Meadowridge Road. It is a three bay wide, five bay deep, gabled roof (running north-south) country gothic style, frame church set on a full foundation, with semi-circular, semi-conical roofed one story high romanesque apse on its south wall and a tent roofed square belfry over its north entrance. The central, double, open bible and cross paneled entrance is recessed, providing shelter for those who enter. It is surmounted by an architrave decorated with a row of dentils above which is inset a gothic arched transom within a gothic arched row of purple, light and dark blue stained glass.

The land on which this church sits was donated to the congregation by an ex-slave, Mr. William H. Jackson who fought for the Union during the Civil War. Descendants of many of the original families are still active in the Congregation and in Howard County.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

St. Stephen's AME Church faces north on the south side of Mayfield Road 1/3 miles east of Waterloo Road. It sits on a gentle hill amidst a stand of trees with a parking area located in front and a driveway around the church. It is a three bay wide, five bay deep, one story high, gabled roof (running north-south), asbestos shingled frame structure built on an old face block foundation. It replaces an earlier frame building located west which faced east.

NORTH ELEVATION

A tent roofed, bell tower is centered over the north central entrance, which is recessed up to the eave line, creating a covered entrance. Nine wide cement steps, flanked by an iron railing lead to the double, open bible and cross paneled door which is surmounted by an architrave decorated with a row of dentils. A gothic arched transom is decorated with a gothic arched row of light and dark blue and purple stained glass inset into a simple gothic arched wooden door frame. A rectangular vent is located above the recessed entrance which is flanked by east and west bays holding single gothic arched, double-hung windows holding one-over-one lights inset into a row of stained glass (See photograph). All the windows from the exterior are gothic arched and inset into gothic arched wooden window frames underlined by projecting wooden sills. On the interior, however, the gothic windows are inset into rectangular frames.

EAST AND WEST ELEVATIONS

Four similar gothic windows are located in the east and west walls. Additionally, a rectangular, open bible and cross paneled entrance, approached by three granite block steps, takes up the first south bay of the east wall. A square brick exterior capped chimney is located between this first and second gothic window north of the door.

Two two light and one four light basement windows rest in the foundation of the east wall, while three four lite basement windows rest in the foundation of the west wall. In addition the west wall holds three entrances to the basement. A gable roof vestibule holds a four light rectangular paneled door in the second north bay of this wall. A simple rectangular entrance rests in the first north bay and a cellar door in the second south bay. The northwest corner of the building holds two corner stones. One is the original laid in 1921 indicating the original church stood here in 1874, while the other notes the rededication of the church in September 1973 when the present north front of the church was added, creating additional space for rest rooms on either side of the central vestibule.

SOUTH ELEVATION

The south wall holds a similar gothic arched window on each side of the semi-circular, semi-conical roofed, one story high apse which holds a roman arched, double-hung window similar in decorative detail to the others. The eave line is decorated with rounded barge boards.

The front extension was constructed in 1973.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

St. Stephen's AME Church is significant to Howard County historically, architecturally and in the field of religion. It was established in 1874. The first building was of frame, facing east, located just west of the present building.

It consists of a half acre of land-more or less and was given to Nicholas Jackson, Wilson H. Jackson, and John Carter, Trustees by William H. Jackson and Susan A. Jackson on September 19, 1874.

William H. Jackson was an exslave who fought on the Union side during the Civil War. He had a farm at this location. Mrs, Snell, his granddaughter, is a present member.

Originally the land belonged to the Pierce family who owned a large tract of land in this area. Jessup was once call Pierceland.

The deed to the church is dated September 24, 1900. William Howard Philip Gardner, Daniel Turner, George Brown and Plummer Daily acquired 2 acres of land more or less to be used as a cemetary for the congregation. The Church has 2 cornerstones.

USGS 15' Quad, Laurel, MD, 1907

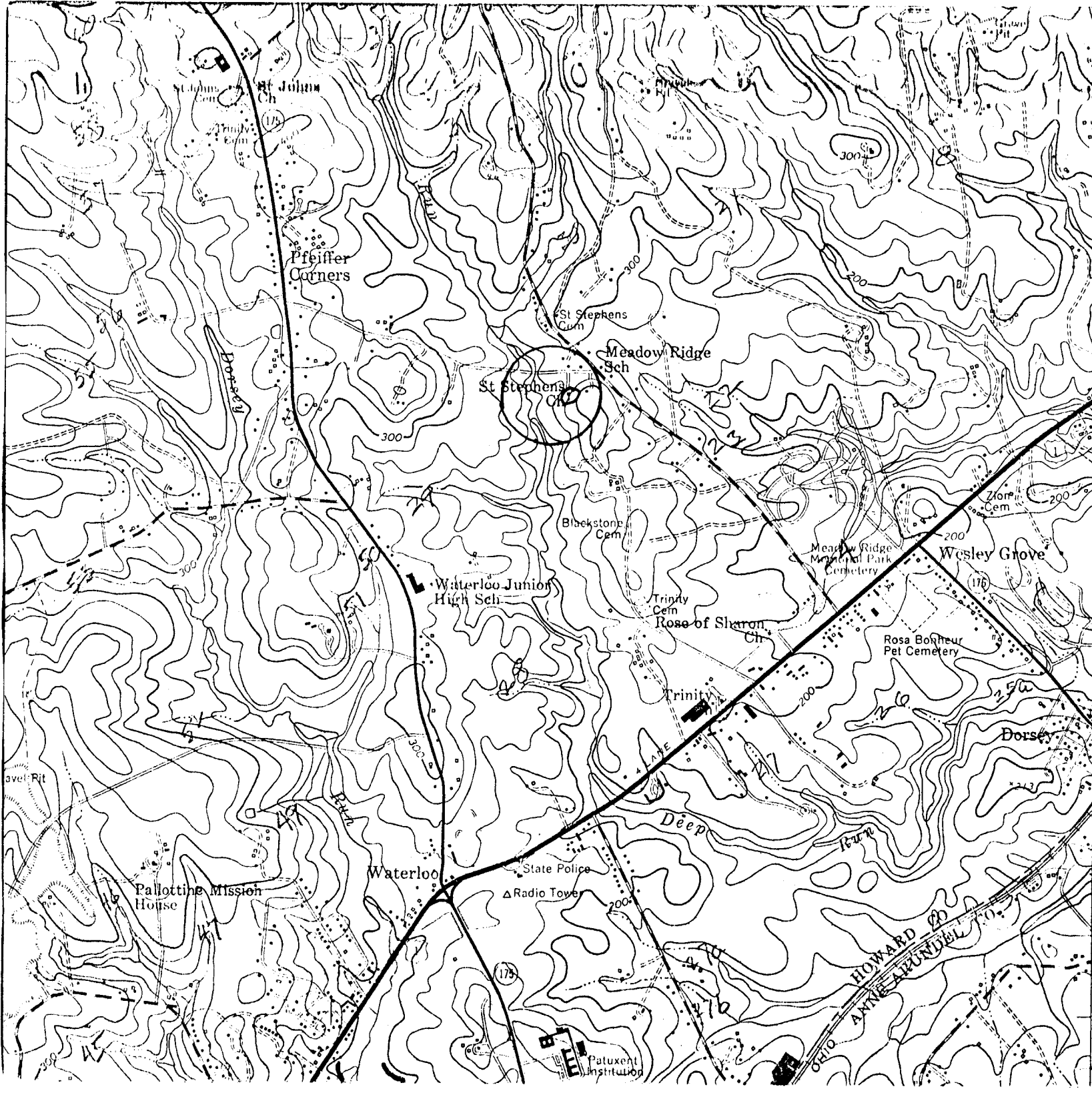
