HO-835 Hubert and Lucienne Mitchell House 3960 Old Columbia Pike, Ellicott City Howard County, Maryland

The Hubert and Lucienne Mitchell House is located at 3960 Old Columbia Pike, on the west side of the road, approximately 1 mile southwest of Ellicott City in northeastern Howard County, Maryland. The house faces south toward the stream and ridge beyond it and is accessed from a long drive in from the road on the south that crosses the stream and ends in a loop. In addition to the frame house, there is a carriage house, frame stable, and springhouse. The house is a 1 1/2-story structure banked into the hill on the north, and is three bays by one bay. It has an exposed foundation on the south that has rubble stone to the west and CMUs to the east, has a gable roof with asphalt shingles, and has aluminum siding on the walls. There is a one-story, two-bay by one-bay shed-roofed addition on the south, or front, of the house. This has a concrete foundation, aluminum siding and asphalt shingles, and is of recent vintage. The first story has a center passage with one room to each side. The second story has a modern bathroom to the north of the stairs and passage, and a chamber to the east and the west. All of the buildings were scheduled to be demolished in late 2006, prior to redevelopment of the site.

The Hubert and Lucienne Mitchell House sits on part of a larger, 37-acre parcel that was owned by John and Mary Mitchell. In 1926, after the death of John Mitchell, his widow sold 12 acres to Hubert Mitchell, presumably her son. In 1937 Hubert and Lucienne Mitchell sold most of this property, 7 acres, perhaps to their daughter and her husband (William and Pearl M. Hill). They, in turn, sold it back to the Mitchells in 1941 after Pearl M. Hill was struck with mental illness, and the Mitchells re-sold the property in 1944. The house on the property was built in two stages, with the earliest section to the west, with a rubble stone foundation. This building was built in the twentieth century. possibly before the Mitchells purchased the land, though it has been significantly altered and there is not enough left with which to date its construction closely. The east half of the house was added later, and some surviving details (such as the boxed newel post) suggest this happened in the 1920s or 1930s. Given that the property was subdivided in 1926, it is reasonable to conclude that one of these two building campaigns occurred during the ownership of Hubert and Lucienne Mitchell. The house has been so altered, however, as to have no historic integrity. The earliest outbuildings, the carriage house and springhouse, probably also date to the Mitchell ownership, though the former has had numerous additions and alterations. The stable was likely added by Broten and Rose Turner, who bought the property from the Mitchells in 1944 and held it until 1975.

The Hubert and Lucienne Mitchell House is located at 3960 Old Columbia Pike, on the west side of the road, approximately 1 mile southwest of Ellicott City in northeastern Howard County, Maryland. The house faces south toward the stream and ridge beyond it and is accessed from a long drive in from the road on the south that crosses the stream and ends in a loop. In addition to the frame house, there is a carriage house, frame stable, and springhouse. There is a collection of other outbuildings on the property that are less than 50 years old, as well as an in-ground pool and a truck trailer stored on the site.

House

The house is a 1 1/2-story structure banked into the hill on the north, and is three bays by one bay. It has an exposed foundation on the south that has rubble stone to the west and CMUs to the east, has a gable roof with asphalt shingles, and has aluminum siding on the walls. There is a one-story, two-bay by one-bay shed-roofed addition on the south, or front, of the house. This has a concrete foundation, aluminum siding and asphalt shingles, and is of recent vintage. All of the windows in the house are now modern one-over-one sash. The main block of the house has three dormers on the south and has an offset gable with a longer slope on the north. There is a one-story addition on the east end of the block, with brick on the lower story, aluminum siding above, a deck, and a rail along the flat roof.

The basement level has two rooms, the west room being a modern kitchen in the stone foundation. The east room has a winder stair along the west wall, with the winder at the south end. It has an open stringer, and the newels and balusters have been cut out. The newel at the base of the stairs was boxed and constructed with wire nails. There is a quirked-ogee-and-bevel moulding on the stringer.

The first story has a center passage with one room to each side. The east room has 2 1/4-inch pine flooring that is tongue and grooved and runs east-west. This room has modern trim and circular-sawn dimensional 2 by 4 studs. The east wall was opened up to the east addition, with a modern fireplace added. The center passage has the same flooring and modern trim as the east room. There is a two-run stair in the center that has a solid balustrade and that ascends to the south, then turns and ascends along the east wall to the north. The west room also has this flooring, but has patches in it indicating that a wall ran north-south in here and probably divided the original section in the stone foundation portion of the building into two rooms. There is all new trim in the west room. The walls have sash-sawn 2 by 4 studs that are painted white, as is the interior side of the lapped wood weatherboards. The weatherboards are fastened with wire nails, one of which missed a stud. There is no evidence of lath, but there are some small holes that could be the result of nails. The walls now have drywall attached with liquid nails. On the rear of the first story is an open porch with rooms below it, set into the hill. This is a modern addition. The stair landing studs have lath nail holes in them.

The second story has a modern bathroom to the north of the stairs and passage, and a chamber to the east and the west. The east chamber has 2 1/4-inch pine flooring that runs east-west, has drywall, new trim, and no other historic features. The west chamber has random-width pine flooring that runs east-west and varies between 3 and 6 inches. It also has drywall and modern trim, with no other historic features.

Carriage House

The carriage house is located about 100 feet southwest of the house and is a two-story, two-bay by one-bay frame structure with board and batten siding and a gable roof with standing-seam metal and an east-west ridge. There are shed-roof additions on the east and west, and the west addition is new. On the north elevation the first-story east bay has a pair of Dutch doors hung on butterfly hinges. The west bay has a single door on butterfly hinges. There is a new sliding door in the center of the second story. The east and west gable ends each have a wood louver vent. The first story of the south elevation has a Dutch door to the west and a six-light sash with head-cut trim. The shed-roofed addition on the east half has plywood and the shed-roofed addition on the east wing has a CMU foundation, German siding, and a six-over-six sash. The east elevation of the east shed has no openings. The

north elevation of the east shed has two vertical-board doors on T hinges, with a small pair of board doors above them. The carriage house is built of 2 by 4s, with 2 by 4 rafters that have a ridge beam, and 2 by 6 joists.

Stable

The stable is located about 50 feet west of the carriage house, and is a one-story, four-bay by one-bay frame structure with board and batten siding that is circular-sawn. It has an offset gable roof with an east-west ridge, and the long side of the gable to the south. The south side has corrugated metal roofing while the north side has asphalt shingles. The south elevation has four Dutch doors on butterfly hinges that lead to separate stalls. The east and west elevations have no openings. The north elevation has three six-light sash in the center and west half. The building is constructed of circular-sawn dimensional 2 by 4s with wire nails. A rabbit hutch was added to the east end of the building.

Springhouse

The springhouse is located about 150 feet south of the house, on the south side of the stream. It is a one-story, one-bay square structure with a CMU foundation, German siding with lattice in the center of the walls, and a gable roof with pressed metal shingles and a north-south ridge. The building is set into the hill on the south. The north elevation has a cross-buck door with beaded-edge-and-center vertical boards on the interior side at the bottom and nothing on the exterior side at the bottom. At the top is lattice on the exterior. The building has exposed rafter ends of 2 by 4s, and does not have any lattice on the south elevation. The interior walls and ceiling are covered with plywood.

All of the buildings were scheduled to be demolished in late 2006, prior to redevelopment of the site.

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









