#### CAPSULE SUMMARY

This two-story, frame Folk Victorian dwelling faces south from its lofty vantage point on a ridgeline between the Patapsco River and Rockburn Branch. The houses rests on a stone foundation and has an asphalt shingle, side gabled roof. The three bay front façade is accented by a central cross gable. The house is arranged in a T-plan with a single pile front section and a two-story, single pile cross gabled rear wing. Wood shingles have been installed over German siding on every façade and all three of the gables feature cornice returns. A substantial single story addition has been made to the west façade of the house and several other cosmetic alterations have resulted in the loss of some of the original details.

The Humphries-Clarkin House is significant under criteria C in the area of architecture. It is a well-maintained example of a Folk Victorian farmhouse. More importantly, perhaps, especially in Howard County, the surrounding area still looks much like it did 100 years ago and the house is still owned by descendents of the original builder.

This two-story, frame Folk Victorian dwelling faces south from its lofty vantage point on a ridgeline between the Patapsco River and Rockburn Branch. The houses rests on a stone foundation and has an ashphalt shingle, side gabled roof. The three bay front façade is accented by a central cross gable. The house is arranged in a T-plan with a single pile front section and a two-story, single pile cross gabled rear wing. Wood shingles have been installed over German siding on every façade and all three of the gables feature cornice returns. A substantial single story addition has been made to the west façade of the house and several other cosmetic alterations have resulted in the loss of some of the original details.

The front (south) façade is three bays wide with three 2/2 double hung wood windows across the second story. A square vent is located in the central cross gable. The first story is concealed behind a full width enclosed front porch. Originally, the house had a central entry flanked on each side by a tall, floor-to-ceiling 2/2 double hung window. The original porch had turned posts and Victorian-style scroll brackets. The porch was gradually enclosed during the 20th century, and a 1970's renovation removed the central entry and replaced it with a window and removed the two large 2/2 windows and placed French doors in both openings leading onto the enclosed porch. The 2/2 windows were reused in an addition built on the west façade of the rear wing. Two interior brick chimneys pierce the roof of the front section of the house. One is located on the front left slope of the roof while the other is located at the ridge just to the right of center. The one on the front slope was constructed in the 1970's; the one at the ridge is a heavily rebuilt version of an original chimney.

The east side façade features vertically aligned 2/2 double hung wood windows, one on each story, in the front section of the house, and a two story addition on the east side of the rear wing. The addition is actually an enclosed porch on the first story with a bathroom added directly above on the second story. There is a reused 2/2 double hung wood window on the second story of this addition and a door on the first story.

The rear façade of the rear cross gabled wing has two vertically aligned 2/2 double hung wood windows, one on each story, and an exterior metal stovepipe chimney. The rear of the front section of the house is visible to the right of the wing and features one 2/2 window on the second story. The first story is obscured behind a large addition extending from the west façade of the rear wing.

The west side façade of the house features two vertically aligned 2/2 double hung wood windows, one on each story, in the front section of the house and a substantial, single story addition extending from the west side of the rear wing. The addition is two bays wide and one room deep and has a side gabled roof. The floor-to-ceiling 2/2 windows that were removed from the front façade of the house were reinstalled on the front (south) façade of this addition.

The overall interior arrangement of space is essentially original with some alterations to individual elements. The house originally had three rooms on each floor and each room measured 13 feet by 15 feet. The front entry led into a small foyer; a door on the left led into the parlor and a door on the right led into the dining room. The central stair rose straight up from the foyer. A door on the rear wall of the dining room led back into the kitchen, located in the rear wing. Originally, there was not direct access from the kitchen to the parlor; a doorway has since been opened between the two rooms. The second floor mirrored the first floor with the stair rising to another small foyer and one more step up in all three directions leading into three bedrooms. In order to eliminate the awkward step up required from the second floor landing, the stair was reworked. The front door was removed, as noted above, and an elevated landing installed. The doors leading into the parlor and dining room were removed and the doorways opened up. Three steps lead up from both the parlor and the dining room to the elevated landing. The steps then continue up to the second floor where the floor of the landing has been raised to the same level as the second floor bedrooms. Originally, there were fireplaces located on the interior walls of both the parlor and the dining room; both have been removed. A corner fireplace has been installed in the front left corner of the parlor. The house retains all of its original door and window moldings consisting of molded architraves with bulls eye corner blocks. The single story addition off the west façade of the original kitchen contains a bedroom and a bathroom. The enclosed porch on the east façade of the rear wing is now the kitchen and the original kitchen is

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now the dinging room.

There are two frame outbuildings on the property. A single story frame outbuilding on a stone foundation located northeast of the house was probably constructed at the same time as the main dwelling and probably served some type of service function as storage space or a workshop. A single story frame garage on a cement block foundation located east of the original outbuilding was probably built sometime later in the 20th century, maybe as late as the 1970's renovation.

The Humphries-Clarkin House is significant under criteria C in the area of architecture. It is a well-maintained example of a Folk Victorian farmhouse. More importantly, perhaps, especially in Howard County, the surrounding area still looks much like it did 100 years ago and the house is still owned by descendents of the original builder.

The Humphries-Clarkin House was built in 1902 by John Humphries for his daughter Elizabeth Clarkin shortly after her marriage. Like many average citizens of the late 19th century, little is known about John Humphries. The family believes that he arrived in the area shortly after the Civil War. He was supposedly in the Navy and just passing through the area when he met and fell in love with his future wife and decided to stay. He bought the property along Rockburn Branch including the house next door to the Humphries-Clarkin House (6150 Rockburn Hill Road) sometime around 1876. He built two additional houses on the property, the Humphries-Clarkin House in 1902 for his daughter and the house across Rockburn Hill Road (house number 6151) for his son. It is unknown what Humphries did for a living. His descendents believe that he was a magistrate down in Elkridge and may have farmed some of his land. The daughter of Elizabeth Clarkin, Elizabeth Anders, was the mother of the current owner, Mrs. Elaine Schulze. When Mrs. Schulze and her husband returned to the property in the mid-1970's after traveling extensively for Mr. Schulzes military career, the house had been vacant for six years and was not in good condition.

The Schulzes made some changes and repairs and the house today is in excellent condition and is a good example of a form and style that was once very common place across Howard County. Extensive development, especially in the eastern part of the county, has made the vernacular Folk Victorian farmhouse an endangered species in the last 20 years. It is noteworthy, however, that Rockburn Hill Road, as a whole, has not experienced the development that has overrun much of the rest of the county and looks much like it did 100 years ago. The construction of I-95 immediately to the south is the only major alteration to the surrounding area in the last 30 years. Of the 11 houses on the road today, only two were built in the last 20 years and the other nine all date to the late 19th or early 20th century. This single road is one of the last places in eastern Howard County outside of Patapsco State Park that retains both a majority of its historic buildings and the integrity of its wooded and hilly surroundings.
