Boone House HO-858 4010 Hunt Avenue Road, Ellicott City Howard County Ca. 1928 Private

The Boone House is a ca. 1928 wood-frame, four-square house located in a small, linear early to mid-20th c. residential suburb off Old Columbia Pike southwest of the Ellicott City Historic District. The house is sited on a .184-acre lot. The property includes the house and a recent garage.

The Boone House has significance as a ca. 1928 four-square house located in one of Howard County's few early 20th century suburban developments. Primarily rural until after World War II, most of the early 20th c. houses constructed in Howard County were built on lots along existing roadways. The Caleb D. Rogers subdivision of the property in 1927 consists of a short dead-end street running perpendicular to Old Columbia Pike lined with small house lots. The lots sold slowly and houses in the area were built through the World War II period. In fact, because the subdivision is neither advanced in its plan nor cohesive in architectural appearance, the area strongly attests to the rural character of Howard County prior to World War II. The houses within the neighborhood represent modest interpretations of the full range of ca. 1920s-ca. 1950s American architectural trends including bungalows, four-squares, Cape Cod cottages, and ranch houses.

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House

Exterior

The Boone House (ca. 1928) is a 2-story, 3-bay, porch-front, four-square house with a hipped roof in good condition. The house has a parged concrete foundation, asphalt or asbestos shingle siding, an asphalt shingle roof, a wood porch, and recent one-over-one replacement windows.

The 3-bay front facade of the Boone House faces northeast. The front facade is symmetrical about its entry bay. On the 1st story, a simple Colonial Revival entry consists of pilasters and flat pediment framing the front door, which is recent. Two windows flank the front door. The 2nd story window openings are vertically aligned with 1st floor openings. A small window opening, which lights the 2nd floor bathroom, is located above the entry. A 1-story hipped roof porch extends across the front facade. A wide wood stair leads up to the porch and gives the house a welcoming appearance. The porch has aluminum columns, railings, and ceiling, a wood floor, and concrete piers.

The northwest side elevation is 2-bays wide. The elevation has two window openings on both the 1st and 2nd stories, which are vertically aligned. The western 1st story window, which lights the kitchen, is smaller. The cellar has one small window opening and a door opening. The window opening is vertically aligned with eastern 1st and 2nd story windows and the door opening is offset to the east of the western 1st and 2nd story window openings.

The southeast side elevation is 2-bays wide. The elevation has two window openings on both the 1st and 2nd stories, which are vertically aligned. An interior brick fireplace chimney runs between the window bays and pierces the roof's southeast slope.

The southwest (rear) facade is 3-bays wide. A recent screened-in porch covers the two northern bays. The 2nd story has three window openings.

Interior

The Boone House has a center hall plan. The living room is located across the southern half of the house, the dining room is located in the northeast quarter of the house, and the kitchen is located in the northwest quarter of the house. The 2nd floor has a hall and bathroom located over the 1st floor hall and four bedrooms. The current owners have added a powder room behind the stair on the 1st floor. The interior retains most of its original features including simple arts and crafts type wood trim, wood stair, five-panel doors, claw-foot bathtub, and a brick fireplace surround.

Garage

The existing garage is a recent 1-story wood structure constructed on the concrete foundation of the original garage.

Site

The house is located on an .182-acre suburban lot in a small subdivision, which was laid out in 1927 and developed slowly through the mid-20th century. The house is set surrounded by a lawn. A few trees and some ornamental plantings frame the house. The garage is set along the rear property line in the northwest corner of the lot and the drive runs perpendicular to the street. A stone retaining wall, which appears original to the site, lines the drive and front edge of the property. A concrete front walk runs perpendicular to the street from the roadway to the front entry.

Owners and occupants

Frederick W. Boone, Jr. and his wife Mary Louise purchased the lot for 4010 Hunt Avenue from Caleb Rogers - who was in real estate - in 1928, took a \$3000 mortgage, and built the Boone House in the following year. Frederick W. Boone, Jr. - a carpenter - was the eldest son of a Howard County house carpenter. He was 21 years old in 1928. The Boone's defaulted on their mortgage and James and Myrtle Ridgely bought the house at auction for \$3310 in 1929. In 1930, Frederick, Jr. (aged 23), M. Louise (aged 21), and their children aged 2 and 8 months had moved in with her parents, Joseph and Julia Eyler. In 1930, James Ridgely was a telephone lineman. He and Myrtle moved to 4010 Hunt Avenue from Clarksville Pike. The Ridgelys purchased an additional 7.1 acres from the Rogers in 1938. James Ridgely died in 1953. Myrtle Ridgely married John M. Reedy and they owned the house until 1962. In 1962, the current owners, James and Erma Wissinger bought the house. Mr. Wissinger was a field service cooridinator and the Wissingers, following the trend of post-World War II migration to Howard County, moved to the area for improved job prospects.


