HO-906 George Gore Farm 6436 Cedar Lane Private

Description:

The George Gore Farm house was recently demolished, and only the barn survives, though it is scheduled to be demolished too. The barn is a two-story, three-bay by one-bay frame structure with the forebay facing south and a ramp on the north, where the building is banked. It has a poured concrete foundation on the lower story and circular sawn board-and-batten siding on the upper story, with a gable roof that has inverted-V-seam metal and an east-west ridge. The eaves are open, with exposed rafters. The interior of the lower story has circular-sawn joists that lap at the two summer beams. The summer beams are constructed of three 2 1/2 by 12s that are ganged together with wire nails. The interior has been subdivided by new walls. The upper story has had partitions and floors added but the original configuration is three bays with a center wagon floor and a hay mow to each side. It is constructed of a circular-sawn heavy timber frame that is mortised and tenoned and pegged and is also nailed. There are four posts in each bent, with the queen posts offset above the single girt, and set beneath the purlins. The girts extend outside of the barn and must contain a knob and neck joint in the post.

#### Significance:

The George Gore Farm was originally owned by William O. Wheary in the late-nineteenth and early-twentieth centuries. Wheary died in 1909 and his heirs sold the farm to Samuel Scott. By 1913 Scott had sold his personal property and left the area, and Gore acquired the farm by deed in 1916. The house, garage, and corn crib were recently demolished, but the house appears from the foundation to have been a twentieth-century structure. Only the barn survived, and it was to be demolished shortly. The barn is constructed of a circular-sawn heavy timber frame, dating it generally to after 1890, but the heavy use of wire nails in the construction of the joints, including the mortised and tenoned ones, the concrete foundation, and the narrow sawn joists (rather than large logs) suggest that the barn was built at least after 1910 and probably after 1920. It hardly seems likely that Wheary constructed new buildings on his farm as he was approaching retirement. It is possible that Scott built them and got into financial trouble, then had to sell, but George Gore, who owned the farm until 1943, was most likely responsible for modernizing the property.

The George Gore Farm is located at 6436 Cedar Lane in central Howard County, Maryland. The house was recently demolished, and only the barn survives, though it is scheduled to be demolished too. The barn is a two-story, three-bay by one-bay frame structure with the forebay facing south and a ramp on the north, where the building is banked. It has a poured concrete foundation on the lower story and circular sawn board-and-batten siding on the upper story, with a gable roof that has inverted-V-seam metal and an east-west ridge. The eaves are open, with exposed rafters.

The north elevation has no openings in the foundation. The upper story has a pair of wagon doors hung on rollers in the center, and they match the siding. The east elevation has two one-light sash in wood frames in the lower story, and no openings in the upper story. The west elevation is identical to the east elevation. On the south elevation, the lower story has three boxed posts beneath the forebay sill. The lower story has a board-and-batten wall with, from west to east, a board-and-batten Dutch door on machine-made strap hinges that is typical for this barn; a boarded up window/vent opening; a typical door; then a pair of board-andbatten doors in an altered opening that appears originally had a single door and a window. These doors are hung on four old machine-made strap hinges and two new ones. To the east of these doors is a typical door; a boarded up window opening; and, a typical door. The upper story has no openings. There is red paint on the knobs of the girts, suggesting that all of the siding must have been replaced.

The interior of the lower story has circular-sawn joists that are 2 1/2 inches by 10 inches and are spaced 16 inches on centers. They run north-south and lap at the two summer beams. The summer beams are constructed of three 2 1/2 by 12s that are ganged together with wire nails. The interior has been subdivided by new plywood and wafer board walls. There are posts under each section of the summer beam. The joists are toe nailed to the north edge of the forebay sill, and there is also a ledger board nailed to the bottom of the sill, with the joists notched to rest on this ledger board. The bent sills also appear to butt and are toe nailed. It is not possible to tell for certain whether or not the bent sills are mortised and tenoned and pegged. The forebay sill pieces are butted just next to the bent sills, and do not appear to have any kind of scarf joint to connect them. The flooring above is of circular-sawn boards. It is not possible to tell what the original configuration of the lower story was.

The upper story has had partitions and floors added of dimensional lumber and plywood, but the original configuration is three bays with a center wagon floor and a hay mow to each side. The northeast corner has an enclosed stair down to the lower story and a vertical board door on rollers into the northeast corner. This is not an old room but could be an alteration. There is no ceiling in this room, and the walls are new. The southeast corner is also enclosed with vertical boards and a door on rollers on the west side. The barn now has a plywood floor. It is constructed of a circular-sawn heavy timber frame that is mortised and tenoned and pegged and is also nailed. There are four posts in each bent, with the queen posts offset above the single girt, and set beneath the purlins. They are braced with nailed braces. The girts extend outside of the barn and must contain a knob and neck joint in the post. The girts are set at the top of the end posts, below the plate. The plates and purlins have half-lap scarf joints. The rafters are approximately 2-by-4s and are mitered at the ridge. They support wide board lath, and there is a hay track in the ridge. Ladders are nailed to the center posts with wire nails.

By 1913 Scott had sold his personal property and left the area, and Gore acquired the farm by deed in 1916. The house, garage, and corn crib were recently demolished, but the house appears from the foundation to have been a twentieth-century structure. Only the barn survived, and it was to be demolished shortly. The barn is constructed of a circular-sawn heavy timber frame, dating it generally to after 1890, but the heavy use of wire nails in the construction of the joints, including the mortised and tenoned ones, the concrete foundation, and the narrow sawn joists (rather than large logs) suggest that the barn was built at least after 1910 and probably after 1920. The frame also uses the knob and neck joint for the connection of the girt to the side posts. This joint was strong and an improvement over most other joints used in this location at this time, which have often failed. It has also been observed at the recently demolished Cooney-Smith Farm (HO-467). It hardly seems likely that Wheary constructed new buildings on his farm as he was approaching retirement. It is possible that Scott built them and got into financial trouble, then had to sell, but is more likely that he never got established enough to build (or was wiped out by a fire). The tax records do not indicate any changes to the property under either of these owners, though the records are not always complete. George Gore, who owned the farm until 1943, was most likely responsible for modernizing the property. (1)






HO-906 George Gore Farm, site 6436 Cedar Lane, Columbia Clarksville Quadrangle, 1957 (Photorevised 1979)


