Description:

The Alta Unglesbee House is located on the northeast side of the road, and consists of a frame house that faces southwest toward the road. It is a two-story, two-bay by one-bay frame structure with aluminum siding covering German siding. It has a gable roof with a northwest-southeast ridge and corrugated metal. The southwest elevation is mostly covered with modern additions. There is also a modern two-story addition on the southwest, set to the south, and a modern one-story addition on the southeast, with a one-story addition to the northeast of it. There is a modern one-story addition on the northeast The first story of the main block has been opened up to create one room partially divided in the center by a sheetrock built-in that covers HVAC ducts. There is an open stairway in the north corner that ascends to the northwest landing, and then turns to the southwest. The second story is divided into three rooms, one on the northwest and two on the southeast.

Significance:

In 1886 Alta Unglesbee purchased a two-acre lot from local farmer Rezin Bennett for \$50, and the following year her husband, John F. (Frank) Unglesbee was assessed for a house and lot valued at \$150. According to the 1900 census, John Unglesbee was a day laborer. His house, then, demonstrates that at least some unskilled and inconsistently employed labor in late-nineteenth-century Howard County was able to acquire some property, and it illustrates how they lived. The house was originally a hall-parlor plan with a stove chimney in the center, similar to tenant houses found on other farms in the region. The Unglesbee house, unfortunately, had undergone considerable renovations and additions in recent years that had removed most of its historic fabric, limiting its potential to enlighten. It was scheduled to be demolished in February 2007.

The Alta Unglesbee House is located at 18220 Penn Shop Road, on the northeast side of the road, approximately two miles south of Mount Airy in northwestern Howard County, Maryland. The property consists of a frame house that faces southwest toward the road. It is a two-story, two-bay by one-bay frame structure with aluminum siding covering German siding. It has a gable roof with a northwest-southeast ridge and corrugated metal.

The southwest elevation is mostly covered with modern additions. There is a modern one-story addition on the southwest, set to the west. There is also a modern two-story addition on the southwest, set to the south, and a modern one-story addition on the southeast, with a one-story addition to the northeast of it. The southeast elevation has four-light sash in the gable end. The house has a box cornice with returns. There is a modern one-story addition on the northeast, set to the east, which has a CMU chimney. The northeast elevation has one opening on the second story east bay, with a two-over-two double-hung sash. The northwest elevation has new sash on both the first and second stories, and a small window opening in the gable end.

The first story of the main block has been opened up to create one room partially divided in the center by a sheetrock built-in that covers HVAC ducts. The flooring is wafer board laid over 2 by 4s laid over top of 2 3/4-inch pine flooring that runs northwest-southeast. The walls have circular-sawn vertical boards with wire nails over top of circular-sawn studs (one of which is visible) and no lath and plaster survives. There is textured plaster on the ceiling. The southwest door has four lights over three lying panels, has a mortise lock, and has butt hinges with pins. There is all new sash. There is an open stairway in the north corner that ascends to the northwest landing, and then turns to the southwest. On the stairway is knotty pine paneling. The stringer is circular-sawn and is nailed to the wall with cut nails. There are new sash and doors and new additions on the southwest, southeast, and northeast, all with paneling or drywall.

The second story has all new drywall, trim and windows. It is divided into three rooms, one on the northwest and two on the southeast. The northwest chamber has a knotty pine paneled built-in closet. The south chamber, southwest wall, has been removed to create a larger room, and has 20th century three-over-one sash.

The attic has dimensional circular-sawn 2 by 4 studs and 2 by 8 joists that run northeast-southwest. The plate is a 4 by 6, and the rafters are 2 by 4s. They are all constructed with cut nails. The rafters are mitered and butted at the ridge and support shingle lath and circular-sawn shingles. There was a small brick chimney in the center of the house that has been removed, and the hole in the roof has been patched. The rafter feet are mitered and sit on a board false plate.

To the southeast of the house is a modern shed built with old telephone poles and 2 by 4s, and it is not historic.

According to the 1900 census, John Unglesbee was a day laborer. His house, then, demonstrates that at least some unskilled and inconsistently employed labor in late-nineteenth-century Howard County was able to acquire some property, and it illustrates how they lived. The house was originally a hall-parlor plan with a stove chimney in the center, similar to tenant houses found on other farms in the region. The Burgess-Sullivan House (HO-646) had such a tenant house. The Unglesbee house, unfortunately, had undergone considerable renovations and additions in recent years that had removed most of its historic fabric, limiting its potential to enlighten. It was scheduled to be demolished in February 2007. (1)




