Description:

The Eugene and Kathleen Boone House is located at 11418 Frederick Road, near West Friendship in north-central Howard County, Maryland. The house faces south toward the road and is a one and one-half story, three-bay by two-bay frame structure with a rock-faced concrete block foundation and a gable roof with asphalt shingles and an east-west ridge. Most of the siding has been removed, exposing building paper over diagonal board sheathing. All of the sash are new aluminum. On the south elevation the first story has a door with eight lights over two panels in the center and paired six-over-one sash in the east and west bays. There is a gabled dormer in the east and west, each one having a six-over-one sash. On the west gable end is an exterior brick chimney. The house has a double-pile plan with two rooms to the front, a cross passage in the center connecting rooms on the east and west ends, and a bathroom and stairway in the center, on the north side of the passage. The house has carpeting, modern architrave with a wide, flat ogee backband and a small ogee on the inner edge, modern baseboard, and two-panel doors with a natural finish. The southwest room has a fireplace on the west elevation that has a stone hearth, a firebrick firebox, and a stone mantel with a wood shelf.

Significance:

After the division of Doughoregan Manor among its heirs, Malissa Buckingham sold 61 1/2 acres to William Harman, who was probably a Howard County developer, in 1935. Two years later Harman signed an agreement with Eugene and Kathleen Boone to sell them 4.43 acres, and in 1938 the deed was executed. In addition to Harman, the grantors included the Home Building Association of Ellicott City, suggesting that the Boones had financed a new house through them on their new lot. Two years later the Boones added another lot of over four acres. The house that they had built on their lot was a standard Cape Cod on a rock-faced concrete block foundation, with four rooms and a bath downstairs and two bedrooms in the attic level. This type of house was popular throughout the 1930s and '40s, and its small, compact size made it still affordable during the Depression. Nothing more is known about the Boones, but the Boone family continued to own the house until 2000, when it was sold to a developer. The house was scheduled to be demolished in late 2007 for new development.

The Eugene and Kathleen Boone House is located at 11418 Frederick Road, near West Friendship in north-central Howard County, Maryland. The house faces south toward the road and is a one and one-half story, three-bay by two-bay frame structure with a rock-faced concrete block foundation and a gable roof with asphalt shingles and an east-west ridge. Most of the siding has been removed, exposing building paper over diagonal board sheathing. All of the sash are new aluminum.

On the south elevation the foundation has a three-light sash in the east and west bays and stone steps in the center. The first story has eight lights over two panels in the center and paired six-over-one sash in the east and west bays. There is a gabled dormer in the east and west, each one having a six-over-one sash. On the west gable end is an exterior brick chimney. The west elevation foundation has a three-light sash in the north bay. The first story has a six-over-one sash in the north bay and a six-light casement on each side of the brick chimney in the south bay. The gable end has paired six-over-one sash with a small wood vent above. The north elevation has an enclosed porch in the center that covers a door with six lights over two lying panels, set to the east, and a six-over-one sash set to the west. There is also a six-over-one sash to the east and west of this enclosed porch. There is a large gabled wall dormer with a six-over-one sash and an interior brick chimney to the east. The east elevation foundation has a stone porch set to the south and a three-light sash to the north. The first story has a gabled porch with new aluminum posts and a 15-light door to the south, and a six-over-one sash to the north. The gable end matches the west elevation.

The cellar has concrete walls and floor and 2 by 10 dimensional joists with diagonal sub-flooring and bridging fastened with wire nails.

The house has a double-pile plan with two rooms to the front, a cross passage in the center connecting rooms on the east and west ends, and a bathroom and stairway in the center, on the north side of the passage. The house has carpeting, modern architrave with a wide, flat ogee backband and a small ogee on the inner edge, modern baseboard, and two-panel doors with a natural finish. The southwest room has a fireplace on the west elevation that has a stone hearth, a firebrick firebox, and a stone mantel with a wood shelf. There is a wide opening on the east that leads to the southeast room. The front door opens in to the southwest room, and there is a doorway to the north that leads to the cross passage. The southeast room has an exterior door on the east elevation. The northwest room has a closet on the east elevation, set to the south. The powder room has all new fixtures. East of the powder room is a dog-leg stair that ascends to the north with a two-level landing that turns back to the south. The northeast room is a modern kitchen but still retains old faux tile on the north, south and west walls. There is a door on the west elevation, set to the north, which leads to cellar stairs. The stair leads down to a landing with an exterior door on the north that leads to a rear porch.

The upper story has a passage that runs north-south. The flooring is 2 1/4-inch oak that is tongue-and-grooved and runs east-west. There is a bathroom in the northwest corner with modern fixtures and tile that matches the kitchen. In the southwest corner is a chamber with a closet on the east elevation, set to the south. The ceiling follows the pitch of the rafters and collar beams. The east side of the upper story has one chamber with original closets built into the northwest corner. The rafters are 2 by 8 dimensional lumber with solid board sheathing.

There are no other buildings on this site except a new garage that is part of the current development.


