HO-960 Longwood Chapel 3169 Washington Road (Route 97) Glenwood vicinity

Description:

Longwood Chapel is located at 3169 Washington Road (Route 97), on the east side of the road, in west-central Howard County, Maryland. The building is a two-story, three-bay by four-bay frame structure with a rubble stone foundation, aluminum siding, and a gable roof with asphalt shingles and an east-west ridge. The eaves have jig-sawn bargeboards. The ground slopes down to the east, leaving the foundation exposed on the east. The building faces west toward the road, and is set close to it. The east elevation has a onestory, one-bay-square vestibule in the center bay, with a gable roof that has asphalt shingles and an east-west ridge. The vestibule has a new six-over-six sash and wood shingles with clipped corners in the gable end. The south side of the vestibule has a modern door. Flanking the vestibule on the west elevation is a one-over-one wood sash in each end bay, with the same arrangement on the second story and no opening in the gable end. The south elevation has three one-over-one sash and a modern door in the east bay, while the second story has four one-over-one sash. There is an interior parged chimney between the two center bays. The north elevation mirrors the south, with a modern door in the east bay and one-over-one wood sash in the remaining bays of both stories, as well as the parged chimney in the center.

Significance:

Emma Warfield Shepherd of "Longwood" was married to Rev. Thomas Shepherd, the minister of the Harmony Presbyterian Church in Lisbon, and at an unknown date she and her sister, Louise V. Warfield, had Longwood Chapel constructed on part of her farm as a chapel of ease. Emma and Louise gave the chapel and 3/4 of an acre to the church, but this deed went unrecorded. Emma Shepherd died in 1914 and services at the chapel were discontinued in 1925 due to dwindling attendance. Harmony church sold the chapel in 1925 for \$300, though it took some time to clear up the title. It was probably converted to a dwelling around that time, but the exterior changes to the building are minimal. There is little visible with which to try to date the building beyond the jig-sawn bargeboards, which have an unusual pattern. Unfortunately, these could be found as early as the 1840s, but did not become common until after the Civil War and continued to be added to buildings into the early twentieth century. The chapel is of interest, too, for being two stories. At present there is no information on whether there were some kinds of classrooms on the first story or a lodge or meeting room on one of the stories, but the chapel is larger than most of the nineteenth-century rural churches scattered throughout Howard County.


