Formerly a part of the land grant "Lost by Neglect" and now called Pleasant Valley. This structure has two components. The 2 story stone cottage built perhaps as early as 1754, and the larger 2½ story west wing with its entrance and portico facing north completed by 1849 when it is described in an insurance policy issued to Henry Forsythe on "Pleasant Valley".

Paneling and woodwork in the newer wing are said to have been made from chestnut trees cut from the surrounding fields and the stones from which this section of the house is built were gathered from the place.

The oldest part of the house, the east wing is a four bay, two story structure with entrance facing south. The north elevation contains two double-hung windows on each story with flat sills. All the windows of the house are new and have aluminum siding frames and six-over-six lites. A simple wooden cornice runs along the gable roof line. The east elevation contains no windows but a chimney at the apex of the gable. The south elevation contains a deep set rectangular door with nine lites on the right side, a double hung window on the west side of the original kitchen door with six-over-six lites. A rectangular horizontal window with 28 lites lies between the aforesaid window to the east and a rectangular wooden door with nine lites to the west. Two double hung windows with six-over-six lites are set above each door on the second floor.

By 1849 the west two story three bay wing was added to the original structure. The north elevation contains the original rectangular door located at the west corner and surmounted by a three lite transom. The fenestration of the building is proportional. All windows are double-hung with six-over-six lites. A brick landing with three brick steps leading to a brick stoop lead to the door.

The west elevation contains a small rectangular double-hung window with six-over-six lites in the apex of the west  $\frac{1}{2}$  story wall.

The south elevation contains two large rectangular double-hung windows with six-over-six lites on the first floor and a one story, one bay square appendage leading from the southwest corner door with a double-hung window with six-over-six lites on the west and east sides of the appendage . Four brick steps lead to a rectangular doorway on the south. An additional thimney is located on the east side of the addition.

A concrete patio extends 3 bays to the southeast corner with the original well located on the southeast corner.

An old  $2\frac{1}{2}$  story barn,  $20 \times 15$  and north of the house has a new appendage 10 feet addition north of the original barn.

A small frame pump house with gable roof and old iron hinges on the rectangular door is located about 60' due south of the barn.

Sites of a previous corn crib and large barn 3 times the size of the present barn and put together with wooden pegs is located north of the property not far from Forsythe Road. A green house is located on the site of a stone foundation which previously supported a wooden building for either curing meat or storing tools.

## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The history of ownership dates back to a land grant "Lost by Neglect", patented in 1775 by Mordecai Selby, Sr. This was a re-survey of the 103 acres he bought in 1754 and chose to call "Selby's Inheritance". The change of name tells a story and has significance. The re-survey, dated 1775, reveals a large "deficiency" of acreage which may explain the new title "Lost by Neglect".

In 1742 a 100 acre tract belonging to Adam Shipley under the name "Good Neighborhood" is found. It is conceivable that the small stome wing of the former Forsythe home could conceivably have been the homestead of this original settler.

The 1754 deed from Shipley to Selby conveys 103 acres of land -"together with all rights, members, appurtances, houses, edifices,
buildings, gardens, orchards, woods, underwoods, timber and timber trees,
easements, profits, commodities, hereditaments, appurtenances,
whatsoever. . ." for 15 pounds and nine shillings. (\$37.50 approx.)

This simple straight forward house with its large fireplace taking up the east wall and spanning the 18th and 19th centuries gives us an example of early Maryland vernacular architecture.

"Pleasant Valley's" association with the Dorsey's and the Forsythes add further significance in an historical sense to this property. In 1801 John Dorsey, Jr. (whose grandfather was "Patuxent John" Dorsey of "Dorsey Hall", whose grandfather was Honorable John Dorsey of "Troy") bought lands from three brothers, Mordecai, Ely and William Selby. This land passed to Mary Dorsey Forsythe and her brother Upton Dorsey.

The name of the house was changed from "Lost by Neglect" to "Pleasant Valley". Here Mary and Henry Forsythe had three sons and three daughters. Their youngest son, William Henry, was deeded "Pleasant Valley" in 1858 and lived here until 1888 when he moved to adjoining "Oakland". His son, Honorable William Henry Forsythe, who became Chief Judge of the Fifth Judicial District was born at "Pleasant Valley" and spent his childhood there.

Both "Pleasant Valley" and "Oakland" passed down to Judge Forsythe. His daughter, Mrs Pope Barrow holds "Oakland" today.

Mr. & Mrs. K. L. Wheeler, the present owners of "Pleasant Valley" have made this charming stone house covered with plaster, a sunny well maintained residence.

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
