The Old Florence Store faces east on the southwest corner of Florence Road and Route 94 in Florence.

This old country store has undergone several transformations since the 1960's, when it was a social center, as well as a store, furnishing general merchandise to the residents of this area. Acquired by Mr. and Mrs. James J. Rosensteel, it has been created into a charming residence with an apartment on the ground floor and second floor.

Originally the country store held one large, rectangular room on the first and second floors, with only a small area of the dirt cellar dug out to store firewood.

Today, little remains except the rectangular, two story high, gabled roof (running north-south) form of the principle building block. The original tall, rectangular, double-hung windows, holding six-over-six lights, have been replaced by more squarely shaped, double-hung windows, holding eight-over-eight lights or smaller windows. A full, cinderblock foundation has been dug out, and, on the east elevation, is faced with brick. This now holds a ground floor apartment.

An old photograph, taken when under the ownership of Mr. J. J. Doherty, indicates a central, rectangular, east entrance door, flanked by six-over-six light, rectangular windows, all of which is covered by a one story high, shed roofed, open porch, supported by four, square, wooden posts. Three similar windows rest above.

This country store replaced a previous store located here and designated on the 1878 $\dot{\text{H}}\text{opkin's}$ Atlas.

The Old Florence Store faces east on the southwest corner of Florence Road and Route 94 in Florence.

Today, little remains except the rectangular, two story high, gabled roof (running north-south) form of the principle building block. The original tall, rectangular, double hung windows, holding six-over-six lights, have been replaced by more squarely shaped, double-hung windows, holding eight-over-eight lights or smaller windows. A full, cinderblock foundation has been dug out, and, on the east elevation, is faced with brick. This now holds a ground floor apartment.

An old photograph, taken when under the ownership of Mr. J. J. Doherty, indicates a central, rectangular, east entrance door, flanked by six-oversix light, rectangular windows, all of which is covered by a one story high, shed roofed, open porch, supported by four, square, wooden posts. Three similar windows rest above.

Today, the building is a three bay wide, two bay deep, two story high, gabled roof (running north-south) frame (covered with aluminum siding) building, originally resting on a stone foundation, which has now been created into a full story, cement block (faced with brick on the east elevation) foundation. A three story high, shed roofed, open porch held on the ground floor by four iron posts, and on the first and second floors, by four square, wooden posts, runs along the entire east elevation. The ground floor of the east facade holds a central, rectangular, entrance flanked by picture windows. The original first floor, central entrance has been replaced by an eight-over-eight light window with the present rectangular entrance placed in the north bay of this wall. Its south bay holds a similar eight-over-eight light window.

The second floor holds end bay, rectangular entrances, with a central bay, eight-over-eight light window.

The south elevation of the building has also been altered. Originally it held a first and second floor, rectangular, six-over-six light, window, in its west bay, the first floor of which was decorated with shutters.

A circular attic window, or bull's eye, was inset into the "A" framed by the gable roof.

Today two narrow, horizontal rectangular, one-one light windows are placed on the first floor of this wall and a west bay, one-over-one light, second floor window with an eight-over-eight light, east bay, second floor window punctuating this wall.

Along the west wall of the building was a one story high, gabled roof (running east-west) pull through garage, with a small area on its east side for supplies and fresh produce from the market, with now has been created into a modern family room with fireplace on its west wall. The large garage doors on the south facade now hold an eighteen light bow window, underlined and supported by an arched brick wall. An entrance door on the east side of the bow window is placed close to the same location as an earlier rectangular entrance into the fresh produce storage area.

One story high, shed roof, open porches have been constructed along both the north and south elevations of this original pull-through garage, which has now become a charming addition to a private residence.

The Old Florence Store at Florence, Howard County, Maryland, is one of the earliest commercial buildings still standing in western Howard County, which was responsible for the creation of Florence as a community. Distinction attaching from age is expanded upon by its original use as a Country Store, for it is, along with the Daisy Trading Post, Pindell's Country Store at Glenwood and Lee's Market in Lisbon, one of the few commercial buildings to serve this area. Additionally, the pattern of adaptive use from commercial to residential over a period of time is significant for two reasons: it reflects a common building practice in the history of the United States, and it mirrors the evolution of this particular community from shortly after the Civil War through the turn of the present century and even to this day.

History and Support

1. J. D. Warfield, a local historian, gives the following history of Florence in which he points out the fact that the community was started as a cross-roads store, this building now in question:

This village was named by Gassaway Watkins Warfield... Though present when it was named, I cannot remember the favorite lady thus honored. Florence was started as a cross-roads store, later becoming a post-office; it is now a business center for a large section of Upper Howard (1905). Hon. Walter M. Black, former delegate to the Legislature, adjoins it on the north and Joshua N. Warfield, of the Democratic Executive Committee and School Commissioner of the County, owns the whole village and adjoins it on the south. Both have converted old fields into productive farms, upon which are commodious houses upon the sites of the progenitor's primitive abodes.

On March 13, 1875 Joshua N. Warfield acquired the property from William R. Warfield. It is generally believed that Joshua Warfield constructed the first country store in this location, which had formerly been used as a blacksmith shop, which stood south of the present building. Joshua Warfield started the store and then rented it out to his brother,

Marshall T. Warfield. Other managers which followed were Clarence Owings, the Warthen Brothers and Mr. Charles Pickett, whose son was once Register of Wills for Howard County. The store burned down one night some seventy-five years ago and the Warfields rebuilt it, renting it out to John J. Doherty, until, in 1923, he bought the store, continuing to operate it until 1964 when it became the property of Mr. and Mrs. James Rosensteel.

- 2. The Country Store in the rural area of the United States served, not only the commercial needs of its neighborhood, but its social needs as well. As late as 1964, one could find four of five men sitting around the store, spinning yarns and passing the time of day. Messages might be put up, serving to inform the community of various events or encouraging political support for one or another candidate. The importance of the cohesiveness and genuine neighborhood feeling it generated is not easily accessed in today's world, which encompassed the large shopping malls of the Baltimore-Washington Area. Here everything was on the human scale and one, one room store provided feed, fertilizer, shoes, yardgoods, groceries and fresh produce for a small community, who all knew one another and were often related.
- 3. A pattern of adaptive use from commercial to residential has been seen in several area of Howard County; on Main Street, Elkridge, where former grocery stores are now fine private residences; in Lisbon, where the shops of blacksmiths and wheelrights are now comfortable homes; to this little country store in Florence, now the home of the owner, with an additional ground floor apartment. This pattern of adaptive use is also seen in both Washington and Baltimore as well.
- 4. The rise of Joshua Warfield's country store and post office in 1878 mirrored and sought to provide for the needs of the community. By 1905, in the words of J. D. Warfield, it was "now a business center for a large section of upper Howard". The store flourished through the next decades until the 1960's, when there was a general decline and final closing. Today, the area remains much as it was at the turn of the century, but two things may be responsible for its demise: 1) the advent of the automobile with its accessibility to other market areas and 2) the rise of the suburban shopping centers of Westview, Normandy and the Columbia Mall, with their more sophisticated approach to marketing. Fortunately, this Country Store has been adapted to a new residential use and remains as a lankmark for the surrounding neighborhood to enjoy.
