

Lift-the-Latch (HO-444) is a one-and-a-half-story cottage that is a contributing element in the Lawyers Hill Historic
District listed in 1993. The house was recorded in the Maryland Historical Trust Inventory of Historic Properties in
1977. The current evaluation was undertaken to determine the property's individual eligibility for the National
Register of Historic Places as part of a noise barrier analysis.
The current appearance of the dwelling is the same as that recorded in the 1977 MIHP inventory form. The lapped
wood exterior cladding, wood-frame windows, entry door, and wood-paneled shutters appear to be original. The
cottage retains integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association.
The house was constructed in 1914 on land formerly part of the "Hursley" estate. The house was designed by
Brognard Okie (1875-1945), a Philadelphia architect who was first cousin to Mrs. Clara Hemphill Davis, the original
owner. The house descended to daughter Rebecca Davis, then to her nephew. Bognard Okie (1875-1945) was a
sted architect and a fellow of the American Institute of Architects (elected in 1932). He resided in New Jersey
and maintained an office in Philadelphia where he practiced independently except for a brief time in the firm of
Duhring, Okie, and Ziegler. Okie's firm specialized in the design of planned communities in the Philadelphia area
in the early 1900s. The majority of his designs were based on medieval prototypes. Okie also specialized in the
restoration of historic buildings. Noted examples of his work include the reconstruction of High Street in
Philadelphia for the 1925-1926 Sesqui-Centennial Exposition; restoration of the Betsey Ross House;
reconstruction of William Penn's Manor House; and, restoration of churches in Paxton and Silver Springs,
Pennsylvania (Withey 1970).
Lift-the-Latch is individually significant under Criterion C of the National Register of Historic Places for its
architecture. The building embodies the distinctive characteristics of a period revival cottage and represents the work
of a master, Brognard Okie. The property boundary is defined by the current parcel. Contributing elements include the circular driveway, the lawn located north of the house, and the mature trees. Non-contributing elements include
the one-car, board-and-batten garage and the open-sided wood shed.

It is a three bay wide, two bay deep, one and a half story high, gable d roof (running north-south) frame structure with a wide exterior stone chimney located just east of center on the south wall. A shed roofed one story high, stone bay window lies just east of the chimney and flush with it, holding a rectangular double-hung window with six-over-six lights.

The north elevation is perfectly symmetrical, holding two first floor tripartite windows and two second floor windows and four square four light attic windows above.

In addition there are two gabled roof dormer windows on the east elevation and a shed roofed dormer window on the west.

#### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Lift-the-Latch is located on the north side of Lawyers Hill Road just west of the Warner-Dobbin House and one mile east of the intersection of Montgomery Road and Lawyers Hill Road. The house faces east holding a central rectangular four light entrance door flanked by rectangular six-over-six light rectangular windows. Above rest two gabled roof dormer windows, holding six-over-six light windows.

The house is a three bay wide, two bay deep, one and a half story high, gabled roof (running north-south) frame structure with a wide exterior stone chimney located just east of center on the south wall. A shed roofed one story high stone bay window lies just east of the chimney and flush with it, holding a rectangular double-hung window with six-over-six lights. The north elevation (Please see figure 1) is perfectly symmetrical, holding two first floor tripartite windows each component a six-over-six light rectangular window and two second floor double hung windows holding six-over-six lights, with four four light attic windows above. The gable roof extends east and west forming cover for the east and west open porches.

The west elevation of the house holds a second floor shed roofed dormer window, holding two double hung, rectangular windows, holding six-over-six lights. One story high open porches are formed by the drop of the gabled roof on the east and west elevations. A one story shed roofed pantry addition lies just north of the six-over-six light kitchen window on the west elevation.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Lift-the-Latch was built by Mr. Robert Coates in 1914 for Mr. and Mrs. Marion Davis after a design by Mrs. Davis' first cousing Brognard Okie, a Philadelphia architect. He had a special flair for colonial architecture and specialized in the renovation of historic buildings. In addition he was a collector of old locks, latches and artifacts. The latch of the front door is one such collector's item.

Mr. Marion Davis founded the Davis-Hemphill Company in Elkridge on Furnace Road in 1906. In 1956 they celebrated their golden anniversary. He and his wife lived in several places before building this house in 1914, among them the tenant house belonge ing to the Dobbin-Warner House just east of the present property now owned by Rebecca H. Davis, his daughter.

Architecturally it is a charming example of cottage architecture of the early twentieth century, featuring rectangular, double-hung windows with six-over-six lights and low pitched gable roof with gabled and shed roofed dormer windows.
