

Description of Property and Eligibility Determination: (Use continuation sheet if necessary and attach map and photo) Hursley (HO-446) is a contributing element in the Lawyers Hill Historic District listed in 1993. The house was recorded in the Maryland Historical Trust Inventory of Historic Properties in 1977. The current evaluation was undertaken to determine the property's individual eligibility for the National Register of Historic Places as part of a noise barrier analysis.			
The house was built ca. 1851. Rebecca Pue Dobbin recorded that this house was built for her brother, William Bose Jobbin, as a wedding present in 1853. William B. Dobbin was recorded in the Howard County tax assessments for the years between 1854 and 1864 as owning acreage with improvements valued at \$4500. The 1877 Hopkins Atlas for Howard County depicted F. Donaldson as owner. The Donaldson family owned the property until 1895.			
The Lawyers Hill Historic District National Register nomination states that Hursley is a "classic Gothic Cottage with a steeply pitched roof and tri-gabled ell form" and is significant under Criterion C. The 1977 MIHP form states that the house is significant historically (Criterion A) and architecturally (Criterion C). Based on previous documentation, the house appears to possess individual significance under Criterion C for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. During the current investigation, access to the property was denied by the owner so that verification of the building's integrity was not undertaken. The house sits at a distance from Lawyers Hill Road and is not visible from the public right-of-way or from neighboring properties. A modern building is currently under construction south of the house on what was formerly the lawn.

This lovely old summer home faces south on the north side of Lawyers Hill Road between The Elk Ridge Assembly Rooms (Ho-381) and Lift-the-Latch (Ho-444).

It is a three bav wide, two bav deep, two and a half story, patterned cypress shingled, gabled roof (running east-west) double milled cypress siding house with central corbeled brick chimney. Two "A" shaped dormer windows rest in the roof of the south elevation, holding two-two light casement windows.

The double paneled one-one light entrance is located in the west bay of the south wall, flanked by one vertical light and surmounted by a one light transom.

The first floor holds a four-four light french door on its north, south and east elevations, with two light transoms, surmounted by flat wooden lintels. A flat roofed one story high, open porch, supported by square columns runs along the entire south, east and north elevations of the house, extending southward over the circular driveway to form a porte cochere, supported by five square columns on brick piles. The second floor, three-three light casement windows are decorated with projecting, flat wooden lintels, sills and green shutters.

A one bay wide, three bays deep, two story high north wing forms an L plan and holds a hipped roof bay window with twenty-two-over-one lights.

A further one and a half story 1897 addition off the west wall forms a T plan and features two hipped roof, one story high bay windows and three gabled roof dormer windows on its south wall and an additional bay on its west.

Dobbin-Warner Gate House

The Dobbin-Warner gate house is located on the north side of Lawyers Hill Road, one mile east of the intersection of Montgomery Road. It is basically a three bay wide, one bay deep, two story high, gabled roof (running north-south) cedar shingled structure with central square corbeled brick capped chimney.

Half the roof line of the west side of the house extends downward forming a one and a half story shed roofed section which holds a sun room on the first floor with north and south doors. That on the south is a twenty one light rectangular entrance door flanked by three vertical side lights. That on the north is a 4-4 light french door which leads on to the flat roofed, one story high entry porch which is held by iron posts and has an iron railing.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Dobbin-Warner house is located on the north side of Lawyers Hill Road, a mile from the intersection of Montgomery Road and Lawyers Hill Road. It sits back off the road, facing south, surrounded by lovely trees and lawn with a circular driveway in front of the house which faces south. It is a two bay wide, two bay deep, two and a halfstory patterned cypress shingled, gabled roof, (running east-west) frame house constructed of double milled cypress siding. A central corbeled brick chimney rises between the two A shaped dormer windows of the south elevation which hold 2-2 light casement windows. A two story high intersecting gabled roof (running north-south) north wing forms an L plan.

The entrance door is located in the west bay of the south wall. It is a double paneled one-one light entrance, flanked by one vertical light and surmounted by a one light transom.

The first floor holds a four-four light french door on its north, south and east elevation with two light transoms, surmounted by flat wooden lintels, and decorated with green shutters. A flat roofed one story high, open porch, supported by square columns runs along the entire south, east and north elevations of the house, extending southward over the driveway to form a porte cochere, supported by five square columns on brick piles. The second floor, 3-3 light casement windows are decorated with projecting, flat wooden lintels and sills and green shutters.

A rectangular attic window rests in the east wall and two 3 light casement attic windows covered by a shed roofed hood on the west wall. The east wall's eave line is decorated with scrolled barge boards.

The two story high north wing is one bay wide and three bays deep with a patterned cypress shingled intersecting gabled roof (running north-south) whose north elevation features a one story high, hipped roof bay window, holding a rectangular double hung window with twenty-one-over-one lights. Above rests a twelve-over-twelve light rectangular second floor window and above a two-over-eight light attic window.

A three bay wide, one bay deep, one and a half story high, patterned cypress shingled, gabled roof (running east-west) extends from the west wall of the main structure. It holds two hipped roof, one story high bay windows holding almost square windows with fourteen-over-one lights. To the east of the bay windows rests a rectangular double hung window. Three gabled roof dormer windows are placed in the roof line of this elevation, holding rectangular, double-hung windows with twelve-over-one lights.

The west wall of the sun porch holds a tripartite window, composed of three three-three light casement windows, flanked by narrow three light casement windows. Above is placed a gabled roof dormer holding a tall, rectangular, two-two light casement window. (Two similar dormers rest on the east side) The north wall of this room holds a small, two-two light casement window.

The remainder of the west wall of the main section of the house holds a rectangular entrance and a two-over-two double hung staircase window.

A wooden belt course runs around the building, separating the first and second floors.

A first floor two-two light casement window is placed on the south wall of the house with two similar second floor windows above, decorated with dark brown shutters, a small four light casement window rests on the east side of these windows, while a four light attic window lies above, on both the north and south walls.

A three bay wide, one bay deep, two story high, hipped roof (running north-south) frame eastwing lies partially along the east wall of the gabled roof structure, extending northward.

Its west elevation has a tent roofed effect and is built on a brick foundation which holds two double-hung, rectangular basement windows, holding six-over-six lights, and two larger but similar first floor windows. The second floor windows are two-two light casements with an additional four light casement window to the south. A wide brick chimney with caps rests along the north wall of this section. A two story high, shed roofed kitchen addition built on a brick foundation rests side by side on the north wall of the hipped roof section. It holds a basement and first floor window similar to the others and eight casement north and west windows for the sleeping porch above. Iron steps and railing on the north wall lead to the rectangular kitchen door and an additional staircase leads to the second floor.

This house was used as a gate house for the Dobbin-Warner House which also had other buildings on the property: two tenant houses, a garage, a barn, and stable with four stalls. The latter two were taken by I-95. The owners of this house originally had a coach-in-four as well as numerous servants whom they housed on the property.

Dobbin-Warner Gate House

The Dobbin-Warner gate house is located on the north side of Lawyers Hill Road, one mile east of the intersection of Montgomery Road. It is basically a three bay wide, one bay deep, two story high, gabled roof (running north-south) cedar shingled structure with central square corbeled brick capped chimney.

Half the roof line of the west side of the house extends downward forming a one and a half story shed roofed section which holds a sun room on the first floor with north and south doors. That on the south is a twenty one light rectangular entrance door flanked by three vertical side lights. That on the north is a 4-4 light french door which leads on to the flat roofed, one story high entry porch which is held by iron posts and has an iron railing.

The west wall of this addition holds a bay window similar to those on the south wall and a second floor twelve-over-twelve light window with an attic window above holding eight-over-eight lights.

A corner stone on its south face has an inscribed date of March, 1897.

A one story, flat roofed enclosed sun porch lies on the north west corner of the west addition while a two story high sleeping porch extends eastward over the open porch of the northeast corner of the main body of the house.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Dobbin-Warner House is significant historically and architecturally. It belonged to one of the Dobbins and at one time had the house just west of the Elk Ridge Assembly Rooms as a gate house as well as a barn, stable and tenant houses. The stable lies under I-95 which took many of the auxiliary buildings belonging to the summer homes on the hill.

This tract of land was known as Hursley and was located between the lands of Elizabeth H. Dobbin and Dr. George W. Dobbin.

On Dec. 18, 1911 the property passed to Conway S. Hodges. (WWLC 92-205)

It was he who conveyed the deed for 0.06 acres of land to the Elk Ridge Assembly Rooms. At about the some time he platted the property then consisting of some 31.83 acres into several lots.

It was later acquired by the Phelps family who made their summer home here. On April 22, 1943 it was acquired by Chester Grassmuck who held the property for ten years. On August 7, 1953 Mr. Grassmuck sold the property to Mr. and Mrs. Hubert Warner, the present owners. (247-232)(32-05)

The acreage of the present house is 5.%5 acres. After the taking of some of the property for the construction of I-95 and the conveying of still more for a parsonage.

Architecturally it is noteworthy as a fine summer home constructed of double milled cedar siding. Another interesting feature is the use of sand for insulation between the floors. Originally built in an L plan in 1871, it was extended in 1897 westward into a T plan.

This building complex is representative of a way of life which flourished on Lawyers Hill from the mid eighteen hundreds. One owner of this house was noted for his beautiful white horses and coach and four. Card parties, tennis, plays, gatherings all added to the gaiety of the summer social season. The large 12' ceiling rooms were filled with people and sleeping porches were added to accomodate numerous guests.

Servants lived on the property and helped ease the tasks of the heavy entertaining which went on.

Today the gate house is being renovated by another owner to place on the market and the fine stable is under I-95. Only the main structure stands with the gate house and another Dobbin house west of the gate house. In addition a new brick building just north of the gate house is occupied as a methodist parsonage.
