

This two story, three bay, gable-and-wing dwelling was recorded in the 1970's as the Shipley House. The house is located near the end of Paradise Avenue on the north side and is set back from the road. A very large two story, four bay frame addition on the east side of the house completely detracts from any remaining historic integrity that the original portion of the house may have had. The original portion of the structure is still clad in asbestos siding and has an asphalt shingle roof. All of the 2/2 windows noted in the original inventory form have been replaced with 1/1 vinyl units.

HO-515 The Shipley House Elkridge Private

The Shipley House faces west, east of the B & O Railroad tracks and off the north side of Paradise Avenue.

It is a three bay wide, one room deep, two and a half story high, gabled roof (running north-south) frame (covered with asbestus shingles) building, resting on a brick foundation with wide, central brick chimmey, intersecting central gable (holding a two light famlight) and one bay deep, one bay wide, two story high, intersecting gable roof (running east-west) frame east kitchen wing (covered with asbestus shingles) extending from the north side of the front section's east wall, resting on a fieldstone foundation and featuring a square brick chimney inset into the center of its east wall.

Fenestration for the house is proportionally scaled, vertically aligned, rectangular and double-hung, holding two-over-two lights. The central rectangular entrance door on the west elevation is surmounted by a two light transom and covered by a one story high, hipped roof enclosed porch, which runs along the entire west wall. A one story high open porch runs along this section's south wall, leading to the entrance to the new kitchen, created by enclosing and entending the one story high open porch, running along the south wall of the original kitchen wing.

The interior features an interesting floor plan with central dividing wall holding two, first floor fireplaces with a fine black marble mantlepiece on the north and a wooden, curvilinearly designed mantlepiece on the south.

A small central hall leads into the south room which holds a fine staircase in its southeast corner. Door frames are composed of fluted lintels and pilasters with squares at each corner decorated with circles.

Located on land once a part of Hanover, owned by Charity Fairbanks in 1866, who conveyed the property to Mary A. Shipley for \$50, the house was constructed sometime before 1878 where it is noted on the Hopkins Atlas.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Shipley House faces west, east of the B & O Railroad tracks and off the north side of Paradise Avenue.

It is a three bay wide, one room deep, two and a half story high, gabled roof (running north-south) frame (covered with asbestus shingles) building, resting on a brick foundation with wide central brick chimney, intersecting central gable (holding a two light fanlight) and one bay deep, one bay wide, two story high, intersecting gable roof (running east-west) frame east wing (covered with asbestus shingles) extending from the north side of the front section's east wall, resting on a fieldstone foundation and featuring a square brick chimney inset into the center of its east wall, which holds a first and second floor, double-hung window with two-over-two lights (the first floor window on the east and north walls of this section of the house feature modern horizontal lights, rather than vertical lights).

Fenestration for the house is proportionally scaled, vertically aligned, rectangular and double-hung, holding two-over-two lights. The central rectangular entrance door is surmounted by a two light transom.









Figure 1 HO-515 Shipley House First Floor Plan

Originally a one story high, shed roofed open porch ran along the south wall of this kitchen wing. This latter was enclosed and extended a bit southward to create a new modern kitchen, while the original kitchen then became a dining room and the north side of the front section of the house a master bedroom. A small section of the east side of the original kitchen then became a bath and hall. (Please see Figure 1)

The building features an interesting interior floor plan. The central entrance leads into a small, square hall with entrance on each side originally.

The south half of the front section of the house holds the staircase in the southeast corner of the room.

The dividing wall between the north and south rooms of this front section holds the wide brick fireplaces for each room. That on the north features a fine black marble mantlepiece, while that on the south features a fine wooden mantlepiece in a curvilinear design.

A hipped roof, enclosed, one story high porch runs along the west wall of this front section, while a one story high, open porch runs along its south wall, creating cover for the west entrance to the new kitchen.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Shipley House is significant to Howard County and the State of Maryland architecturally as a fine example of a nineteenth century frame house and historically significant in its connection to Charity Fairbanks, who helped develop the north side of Paradise Avenue, leading up to the Old Baptist Church.

Architecturally, the building features an intersecting gable with two light fanlight and a square, central brick chimney inset in the middle of the dividing wall of the front section of the house, which holds a black marble mantlepiece on the north, and a frame curvilinearly designed mantlepiece on the south.

The floor plan is most noteworthy, for it features a small, square central hall leading into the south room which holds a southeast corner staircase. This is an exception from the more familiar central hall and staircase, running the length of the house taking floor space from the room on each side of it.

The west section rests on a brick foundation with the east section on a fieldstone foundation, leading to a belief that the east section might first have been constructed.

Historically, the land on which the house stands was once a part of a larger tract of land called "Hanover", from which a large part of Main Street, Elkridge was carved. Charity Fairbanks, the owner in 1866, is noted on the 1860 Martennet Map in the little house, located southwest of the Shipley House, and once owned by its owners, Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Gray, who acquired the property from Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Carroll Toomey on June 21, 1958. (317-4) The Toomeys had acquired the two lots and houses from Mary A. Shipley, widow of Lloyd G. Shipley of Baltimore City, on July 26, 1887 (63-257) for \$1,000, who in turn had acquired these two lots and houses from Charity Fairbanks between the years 1866 and 1868.

Charity Fairbanks owned all of the north side of Paradise Avenue. Two buildings along this street are noted on the 1860 Martennet Map. One is the small, two story high, gabled roof (running east-west), four room frame house with square, central brick chimney, located just southwest of the Shipley House. This small house with a half acre of land was conveyed to Mary A. Shipley by Charity Fairbanks on January 26, 1866. (25-40) The other house is located on the northwest corner of Paradise and Railroad Avenues, designated as Mrs.Fairbanks House - HO-516. On August 10, 1868, Mrs. Fairbanks sold a second lot to Mrs. Shipley. (29-114) The 1878 Atlas indicates the east section of the north side of Paradise Avenue

belonging to Mrs. Fairbanks, and the west side belonging to Mrs. Shipley. The present Shipley House on the second lot is also indicated.

This little four room frame house, which dates from at least 1860, has been enlarged considerably by a two story high, east wing, along and extending north from its east wall, and has been completely modernized. It is now the property of a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Gray.

Of significance architecturally and historically to the State of Maryland and Howard County, the Shipley House, in conjunction with the Railroad Avenue Historic District, should be placed on the National Register of Historic Places, (should its residents so desire) as well as the State Critical Areas Program and any local landmark ordinance which the local residents might seek to initiate.
