CAPSULE SUMMARY

Wessel Farm

11460 Scaggsville Road (HO-721)

According to oral tradition, the original dwelling associated with Wessel Farm at 11460

Scaggsville Road, a log house, was first occupied by the Krause family, who lived on the

property in 1860 according to Martinet's map. According to the current occupant, the log house

was incorporated into the current dwelling. Based on visual inspection of the exterior of the

house, this could not be confirmed, and the existing exterior fabric seems to date from 1870-

1885.

The house, a 2 1/2-story, three-bay I-house, employed the popular Gothic Revival-style. Set on

a random rubble foundation, the wood frame house is clad in German siding at the facade and

in weatherboard at the secondary elevations. Typical of the Gothic Revival style, the dwelling

is covered with a side gable roof with a central cross gable above the central entry. The

symmetry of the house is reinforced not only by the cross gable and central door but by the one-

story, five-bay porch with carved brackets, and the flanking corbelled cap interior end chimneys.

A one-story, wood frame, shed roof extension has been erected at the rear of the house.

The Wessels were a prominent family who amassed a large amount of property in the Scaggsville

area in the late nineteenth century. Since 1900, the property has been owned by the Wessels, a

prominent Scaggsville family who amassed a large amount of land in this area in the late

nineteenth century. At that time, Herman Wessel purchased the house and surrounding land from

the Harding family.

According to oral tradition, the original dwelling associated with 11460 Scaggsville Road, a log house erected by the Krause family in the middle of the nineteenth century, is incorporated in the The existing I-house, which dates from 1870current dwelling. 1885, is 2-1/2 stories in height and three bays in width.1 Designed in the Gothic Revival style, this dwelling rests on a random rubble foundation. The wood frame walls are clad in German siding at the facade and weatherboard at the secondary elevations. The dwelling is covered with a side gable roof with a central cross gable above the central entry. The symmetry of the house is reinforced not only by the cross gable and central door but by the one-story, five bay porch with carved brackets and the flanking corbelled cap interior end chimneys. A one-story, wood frame, shed roof extension has been erected at the rear of the house.

The Wessel Farm is set approximately 300 feet north of Scaggsville Road. A long gravel drive leads through agricultural fields to the house. Mature trees are clustered around the house, and additional fields extend behind the house.

EXTERIOR DESCRIPTION:

The southwest elevation of the house, the facade, is three bays wide. The first story is marked at the center by a single-leaf panel-and-light door with a transom and a square-edged surround. Flanking the door are two 2/2 windows with square-edged casings. The second story is marked by three 2/2 windows, and the upper half story is marked in the cross gable with a 1-light window with square-edged casings. A one-story, five-bay porch with chamfered posts, carved brackets, matchstick balusters, and a hipped roof extends across the full width of the facade.

The southeast elevation is pierced with two windows with square-edged casings, one non-original 6/6 window at the first story and one 2/2 window at the second story.

The first story of the rear elevation (northeast elevation) of the house is partially obscured by a one-story shed roof addition. The western portion of the addition forms a cut-away porch, revealing an original 2/2 window with square-edged casings. An additional

2/2 window is located within the northeast wall of the addition, and a third 2/2 window is located to the east of the addition. Within the porch, at the northwest wall of the enclosed area of the addition, is a single-leaf, panel-and-light door. Each of the three bays of second story is marked with a single 2/2 window with square-edged casings.

The northwest elevation of the house is composed of the original gable end wall and the end wall of the addition. The gable end is pierced by two 2/2 windows, one at the first story and one at the second story. The shed roof addition is also pierced at this elevation with a single 2/2 window.

OUTBUILDINGS:

A number of outbuildings are located to the northeast and northwest of the house. To the northwest of the house stands a one-and-a-half-story, wood frame barn that dates from the 1940s. Set on a concrete foundation, the barn is clad in vertical board siding and covered with a front gable roof of corrugated metal. Behind the barn is a wood frame machine shed that dates from the 1950s and is clad in vertical board siding and covered with a standing seam metal shed roof. West of the shed is a 1940s metal clad silo with a domed roof.

To the north of these three outbuildings is a large hay barn that dates from circa 1920. Set on a random rubble foundation, the wood frame building is clad in vertical board siding and covered with a front gable metal roof with a hay hood. The barn has several onestory additions that have been erected at the northwest, northeast, and southeast elevations.

West of the large barn are a number of wood frame sheds. Two of the small wood frame sheds, one with a gable roof and one with a shed roof, are in a state of disrepair, both dating from the 1930s or 1940s. Also west of the barn are two 1940s hog houses with slatted wood walls and steep gable roofs.

Also west of the large barn are two small sheds that date from the 1940s or 1950s. Both sheds are clad in vertical board siding and covered with front gable roofs. One L-shaped wood frame shed, probably constructed in the 1960s, is located in this area. This shed, which serves as a tool shed, is set on a concrete foundation, and is clad in vertical board siding, and covered with a shed roof.

One additional outbuilding is located to the southwest of the house along the gravel drive. The shelter, which dates from the 1920s, is clad in wood weatherboard laid over vertical board siding. The shed roof reveals exposed rafter tails and is pierced by a stove pipe.

In the east corner of the property there is reportedly a family grave site. This site, however, could not be accessed at the time of the survey.

According to oral tradition, the first dwelling on the site was a log house first occupied by the Krause family, who purchased the property in 1864. The house appears on the 1878 G.M. Hopkins Map, placing the date of the building between 1865 and 1878, although the appearance of the house reflects a later remodelling. The property has been owned by the Wessel family since 1900, when Herman Wessel purchased the house and surrounding land from the Harding family. According to the Wessels, the current I-house form incorporates the original log dwelling; however, this could not be ascertained from visual examination of the exterior of the house. According to the current occupant, the house was renovated in 1912.

The Wessels were a prominent family who amassed a large amount of property in the Scaggsville area in the late nineteenth century. Montpelier, which dates to 1760, stood at the northwest corner of Johns Hopkins Road and Columbia Turnpike, was another large Wessel family property that stood in this area.

The house presents a typical example of the vernacular Gothic Revival style, as adopted in rural Maryland. This style, which gained popularity as a "rural" style, was often used in the design of farmhouses and dwellings throughout agricultural communities across America at the turn of the 20th century. This house -- an I-house with the center of the facade emphasized by a front gable, and a centrally placed window in the gable -- is typical of the Gothic Revival style. The limited ornamentation reflects the customary dependence on the form of the building to convey an association with a particular style.


